

Which should immediately tell you that given the right canvas and backdrop, such diversity would result in spellbound visages when seen through film cameras on the large screen. Be it the indigenous culture or its amazing lifestyle, Northeast India is totally divergent from rest of India. ## Assam

Gift-wrapped with rolling fields of aromatic tea, canoes sailing down the Brahmaputra river, or thick jungles with the most bizarre wildlife, Assam is the most charming state in North East India. The Kaziranga National Park is home to two-thirds of the planet's population of the one-horned rhinoceros. Apart from that, this national park is also a World Heritage Site. It's vibrant, well preserved with sustained ecology and bio diversity.

Other famed jungles of Assam include Manas National Park, Hoollongapar Gibbon Wildlife Sanctuary and Nameri National Park. Any film with jungle as a backdrop will do well to choose Assam. Other bewitching places include Majuli Island. India's largest riverine island formed by the turbulent Brahmaputra, which sprawls over an area of 452 sq km. Most of the islands in Majuli get submerged in water during monsoon; however, the bigger islands like Kamalabari, Auniati and Garamur remain in a better condition. Majuli is a bird watcher's paradise and the camera wielders are simply going to get hooked to this place.

Established in 1911, the Tocklai Tea Research Centre is among the largest and oldest tea research stations in the world. All the scientific knowledge that the world holds about tea, has come from this centre in Assam. A documentary or short film on tea has to shoot here.

Beautiful and historical places like Jorhat, Sivasagar, Tezpur or the mesmerizing hills of Haflong, North Cachar will leave one gasping. Truly, Assam is a bounty waiting to be discovered. Assam also boasts of its capital Guwahati, the largest cosmopolitan city in the North East which is often referred to as 'the Gateway of North East India'. Hence a quick city shoot amidst all the natural beauty is also possible in Assam.







### Arunachal Pradesh

If you have not thought of Arunachal Pradesh as a shooting location, you have done yourself a disservice. Yes, it is time consuming as there is no airport in AP and most of the places has to be reached by road. But if you want exotic locations, a little time does not matter. The total journey from Tezpur airport to Tawang is a treat to the eyes. Dirang Valley and Sela Top, where you can see the zigzag road carved on the mountain is just awesome.

Encompassed by blue lapis flowers, Peng Teng Tso Lake is one of the most beautiful places in Tawang. The place boasts of picturesque natural beauty and makes a surreal landscape with the flowers and snow. The calm waters of this serene lake offer a splendid view of the Himalayas that adorn the background. Maintained by the Indian army, this lake is located 17 km away from the main town replete with a charming landscape comprising of snow-clad Himalayas, a breathtaking trail of rhododendrons and tranquil waters. Peng Teng Tso Lake is a beautiful destination for film shooting in Arunachal Pradesh that must not be missed.

Often reckoned as one of the most fascinating waterfalls in India, Nuranang Falls is one of the hidden gems of Tawang. Originating in Sela Pass, Nuranang Falls is a serene place where you can behold a stunning landscape. Located at 6000 ft. above sea level, Nuranang Falls takes you in the middle of untouched forests as you enjoy the wonder of nature.

Encompassed by pristine hills, verdant greenery and a thick cover of mist, Nuranang Falls is one of the must-visit places for song shooting in Tawang.

One of the most picturesque places to visit in Tawang, Nagula Lake is a high altitude lake that is a delight for nature lovers. With some alluring reflections of the mountain in its serene waters, Nagula Lake is a captivating tourist attraction in Tawang. The scenic landscape of the lake will leave you spellbound and one can spot a number of Brahminy ducks around the lake. Although the lake is known for heavy military presence owing to its location near the border, the place can be a good destination for film shooting in Arunachal Pradesh.

Shonger Tsher Lake, popularly known as Madhuri Lake is known to be the place where the famous Bollywood song from the movie 'Koyla' was shot. The lake is known for offering panoramic views of the landscape and has been quite a popular spot for film shooting in Arunachal Pradesh with wonderful scenic beauty.

The Tawang monastery is very picturesque. It is said that this is the biggest Buddhist monastery in the world outside of Lhasa. The Ziro valley of Arunachal Pradesh is also very beautiful if you are looking for huge stretches of paddy fields surrounded by mountains. The Apatani tribe with their unique traditions & attires are a very good subject for film shooting.
